

vatory. The group took in two 35 minute shows about the universe and the night sky. It is interesting to see what


beauty the heavens hold without all the city lights. Truly magnificent.

The Brain of the Model A Ford

This month's topic will be on safe driving the Model A Ford. It is a remarkable machine. It moves by the power produced by the combustion within. It is self-propelled, self-moving, -no horse required - It is a mechanism which is constantly being improved by member's upgrades. But is never complete until the driver is added.

Let us consider this: Every year we add new safety devices to our Model A Fords, such as turn-signals, added volts, mirrors, safety belts etc. Then why does it not become completely foolproof on the road? Can it ever become completely foolproof? No, not once the fool is added behind the wheel! It would have to be able to learn from experience, to be able to deal with new and ever-changing situations and react to emergencies and to act with a conscience. But it can never be made to do these things because it can never be given a brain.

The driver is the brain and the controlling force of the Model A. Without a driver the Model A could do nothing. He is responsible for what his car does as he is for anything else that he does himself. In fact his car can be thought of as an extension of himself whenever he is behind the wheel. The Model A can be a useful tool to man, just like all the other inventions.

But the automobile is the most complicated tool used by the majority of people. Moreover it is potentially the most dangerous. For this reason any effort which man expends in mastering this tool, before attempting to control it in involved activity of highway traffic, is effort well-spent. The Model A is an unreasoning irresponsible instrument with awe-inspiring 40 horsepower. The capable driver applies its power and releases it whenever he desires. He alone checks and controls the Model A at will and converts it to a safe instrument of good motoring.

Keeping It Original or Upgrading by Dick Wyckoff

Many of us love our Model As as original as we can make them. Others like some upgrades for their own personal reasons. I happen to be in both camps. My '29 Roadster PU has been brought back to it's condition as it was in 1962, modifications and all. The '30 Cabriolet is as stock as I can make it, with one change. I have an alternator.

This may not seem like a big thing, but I like an alternator. I just don't like how it looks.

At the swap meet in Turlock in January, I happened on a booth manned by a fellow A'er from Simi Valley, Russ Evans. He has come up with a clever compromise. Russ has installed the guts of a modern Toyota alternator into the housing of a Model A generator. It looks absolutely stock with pulley, relay and everything. Over a period of two years, he and an electrical engineer friend worked out the machining and wiring problems and are now fabricating 6 and 12 volt alternators that look great. They are 45 amp output, fully tested, and have, so far, been run trouble free on Russ' car for over 8000 miles.

So, if you are in the same predicament as I am, here is a chance to fix it. The cost is \$280. Kinda pricy but a lot of manufacturing time and engineering goes into the project.


Chips and kindling wood were brought into the kitchen in that apron. From the garden, it

Tool Talk by Rick Black, El Paso Texas

The original tool kit supplied with the Model A and AA vehicles consisted of the following 13 items:

- 1. Adjustable wrench
- 2. Engine crank and wheel lug wrench
- 3. Grease Gun

11. Tire Iron

- 4. Instruction/Owner's Manual
- 5. Jack and Handle

6. Oil can (thru May 1928)

- 7. Open end wrenches— $7/16 \times 1/2$ and $9/16 \times 5/8$
- 8. Pliers (screwdriver blade on end of handle)

9. Screwdriver

- 10. Spark plug/ Cylinder Head Nut wrench
- 12. Tire Pump 13. Tool Bag


Many people see old tools with FORD script on them and assume they're for a Model A or Model T. What I've found interesting is that few, if any, Model A tools had part numbers on them! Model T tools did, most of the time. And beginning in 1932, almost all Ford tools had a part number on them that also identifies the first year they were used. The same numbering system is in still used today.

4# Pressure Radiator Cap Discovery by Dick Wyckoff

Some of us run pressurized radiators in in our Model As for whatever reason. One of the problems we have had is finding a 4 lb radiator cap designed for a fluid recovery system. This would be similar to a modern car with a 17 lb system. While at the swap meet in Turlock this last month, I had a chance to walk through a store called Tractor Supply Co. In there was a section with radiator caps for Ford 4-cyl tractor engines. On a hunch, I bought a 4 lb cap and guess what, it is exactly what we have been looking for. It is designed for low-pressure, overflow recovery cooling systems.

So, for those of you looking for such a cap, go on-line to **TractorSupply.com** and in the top corner is a place to search for parts by number. Type in **0237958** and it will come up with the 4 lb cap that fits our needs. The cost is about \$8.

While your at it, you might check item # 4020963. It is a collapsible, bright orange safety cone that could be carried under your seat in case of emergency. I got one of them, also. It is \$7.


