
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# Tim's Team Talk A Note from our President Tim Harrison



#### "A" View from the Slow Lane

As the summer began with Memorial Day, I was in Big Bear CA going to garage sales. At one sale, I scored six issues of Ford Life magazine published in the '70s about Ford people, places, and events. If I had been in my Model A station Wagon, it would have been perfect. Anyway, here are a couple unique articles I found interesting.

With some of our longer tours coming up, make sure all of your safety items are in good shape. Check the oil, water, air pressure, ignition, lights, brakes, and fuel system. Have some spare parts available if you (or another member) needs help. A Triple A card is nice to have, also. . . . . .

#### ANY COLOR BUT BLACK

In this day of psychedelic pastels, metal flakes and bright acrylics, it's a rare day when you see a black car roll out of a Ford dealer's showroom. Back in Granddad's day, black was the only color a new Model T came in. Of course, that was to facilitate mass production since it was found that Japan Black was the only paint that would dry fast enough to keep body assembly in motion.

Today, with the paint drying problems long ago overcome, and with a drastic change in consumers' attitudes, black is no longer a basic Ford color. In fact, the color must be special ordered on all 1971 Fords at an across-the-board \$75.00 additional price.

#### **Astonishing Ford Facts**

DEARBORN, Mich, May 22, 1924 — It takes more than 254 miles of copper tubing a day to supply just one requirement in the radiator department of the Ford Motor Company's plant at Highland Park, under the present high-production schedule. In other words, the copper tubing used annually for Ford radiators would go around the world three times.

The radiator department is called upon to produce 9,000 radiators a day and materials necessary to attain this output runs into surprising figures. In addition to the copper tubing, of which ninety-five pieces 18% inches long, go into every radiator, other materials used in a single day's production of radiators comprise thirty-eight tons of sheet steel, six tons of terne plate, sixty-seven tons of brass, nine tons of solder, 18,000 malleable castings, more than four miles of brass tubing for drains and 1,068 gallons of acid. In the making of a single radiator, 140 operations are necessary and every step of the manufacturing process requires unusual care. Ford News

## Technical Talk

# Overlooked Model A Lube Points By Dick Wyckoff

Like most Model A drivers, I try to lube all the fittings specified in the lube charts at the appropriate interval. However, there are several others locations that are not mentioned that I think should be visited on occasion. I have listed 12 but there are probably more depending on the body style you own, truck, sedan, convertible, etc. I use 3-in-1 oil because it is convenient, but any oil would probably work fine.

- · Leading the list are the hood hinges. There are three rods inside the formed sheet metal hinges that rarely get any attention. It takes some effort to get to the openings in the hinges from the underside. You have to come from left and right sides to get all the openings.
- · While we are working on the hood, how about a couple drops of oil in the hood latches. They are exposed to the weather and rarely if ever get any attention.
- · While under the hood, a drop of oil in the spring-loaded ends of the spark and throttle rods. They wear too.
- · Moving to the vehicle cab, there are some forgotten locations there too. One that comes to mind is the bushing where the throttle control rod and the spark control rod go down the steering column just behind the steering wheel. On the '28-'29, the bushing is very easy to locate. It is slightly hidden on the '30-'31. Just a drop of oil there and you will be surprised how easily the control rods move.
- ·Simple locations while in the cab are the <u>door hinges and door latches</u>. Perhaps a little oil on the door stop wouldn't hurt either.
- · Also in the cab, a little graphite lube in the ignition key might make things work easier. No oil here.
- While I don't have a seat adjustment on my cars, I think some lube (your choice) on the <u>screw</u> mechanism and the track would be in order.
- · The upper windshield hinge is tough to get at. Perhaps WD-40 or a silicone spray lube could work.

#### We have to get under the car for a couple more lube locations.

- · Clutch linkage needs to be lubed. A couple drops where necessary will do.
- · How about the emergency brake mechanism? We have the linkage itself and the pawl mechanism, both need a drop or two.
- Probably one of the most used pivot points that never get attention are the clevis pins at the end of the brake rods. They get used every time we use the brake. A drop of heavier, engine oil would work well here.
- The last on my list is the seldom used trunk or rumble hinge. A drop wouldn't hurt.
- · Not mentioned is the window crank mechanism. That would require removal of door panels thus not easily accessible.

#### History of the Quail as the Model A Mascot

From the twenties until World War II, mascots had their day. Some symbolized the car name or outstanding feature. Some were just plain pieces of real art that was complimentary to the car. Ford's Flying Quail was advertised as symbolizing the guick getaway of the Model A.

Ford's Flying Quail was like the car itself: It was massed produced from relatively cheap materials (it cost then less than \$1 to make) and thus, couldn't qualify for class distinction that some of the more elaborate and expensive car mascots enjoyed. But, just as the Model A on which it sat, it was a classic in itself. It did what it was meant to do and looked good doing it.

Although it looked delicate, it was sturdy. It kept water in and dirt out and was almost theft-proof. It was complimentary to the design of the car. The fact that the quail - a delicate, yet rugged creature, able to survive in the roughest envi-

ronment, beautifully feathered, small in size and fast in flight - was chosen to symbolize the Model A was indeed a clever choice.

The quail mascot was decided upon by Henry himself. Irving R. Bacon, an artist in Henry's employ originated the pose and made the first clay model. An actual quail that had been stuffed and mounted was used as a model. The first model designed had wings tipped down and fastened to the sides of the radiator. Another was designed with a moto-meter enclosed under the wings.

They were placed on six cars for Edsel Ford to pass judgment, but he wasn't very enthusiastic about them. But in one year, 240,000 were sold, netting the company \$240,000 profit.

The Flying Quail was not produced by the Ford Motor Company. The final designing, modeling an acceptable prototype, tooling and producing the finished product was sub-contracted to the Stant Mfg. Co., located in Connersville, Ind. The Stant Mfg. Co. was known for their radiator cap business before tackling the Ford's Flying Quail. But in all their previous experience and all their experience since, the Flying Quail was an ordeal like they ever encountered. Old timers still reminisce, like comrades do about campaign battles, about the "battle of the birds".

With only Henry's idea and Irving Bacon's clay model, the Stant Mfg. people set about their task of finalizing the design.

First, they acquired a covey of live quail for study. The birds were placed in specially constructed cages. The cages were set up in the middle of the Engineering Dept. Drawing tables and desks were rearranged to make room for the staff of artists, photographers, and draftsmen and engineers assigned to learn all about how an Indiana Bob White looked.

Three maddening days passed while the Engineering Dept. resembled something from a Mack Sennett comedy, while photographers shoved cameras around, artists shoved easels around, draftsmen shoved drawing board around and engineers shoved everybody around – trying to get the frantically flapping, screeching quail to pose.

The Engineering Dept. had the atmosphere, including smell and sound effects, of an aviary invaded by cats.

In spite of all the turmoil, the job got done. The quail were photographed and sketched in hundreds of poses.

The artists were supplied with stills from the photographers for more careful detail, and then the artists supplied the engineers with the most attractive poses. The engineers then selected the ones most suitable for die -casting and finally, the best of these were submitted to Henry for his selection and final approval.



Of all the more than 5000 parts that were required to make the Model A, Henry seemed to take more direct, personal interest in the accessory cap. Every step of the project from the first design to drawing to first article produced required his personal approval, and he was a hard man to please. Stant representatives wore a path between Connersville and Dearborn, trying to satisfy the Boss.

Henry finally chose the pose we all recognize today. One closely resembling the original one Mr. Bacon suggested.

Then the master model was constructed from clay in all complete detail, feathers and all, then was dusted with aluminum powder for realism and submitted to Henry for comment. His suggestions smoothed out most of the detail and unneces-

sary lines for ease of plating and polishing. without alteration. The steel production die was made and the Stant Mfg. Co. had a run of Flying Quails that extended beyond production of the Model A by several years and totaled several thousand units.

The Flying Quail originally retailed through Ford dealers for \$3.00 each. The dealers cost was \$2.50 for the 1930-31 version and only \$1.75 for the 1928-29 version. Can you vision buying and original quail for \$3.00?

Since it is roughly estimated that there are still a half million Model As on the road and probably less than 5% carry genuine Flying Quails and since more than a quarter-million Quails were built, a logical conclusion might be that restorers have yet to uncover all those precious birds that must still be roosting in secluded sanctuaries.

It is of interest to know that a blue-print of the Flying Quail in a longer and lower, more streamlined pose mounted on a lid type cap was dated June 17, 1932. Perhaps Henry had considered one for the new 1932 Ford and then changed his mind. Doesn't that make you wonder?

We were also served a nice buffet lunch in their dining facilities as a thank you for bringing the cars... A good time was had by all .... to be continued .... next year ...





















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
