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Tim's Team Talk A Note from our President Tim Harrison



A View From the Slow Lane

Recently I came upon an old Saturday Evening Post article from 1936 written by Henry Ford. The title was "Our Job."

There were many thoughts relating to economics and Ford's thoughts about the importance of production over scarcity. He believed production was not a simple term more than a factory or manufacturing term. It is a term of deep social importance: "Production and the effects of production give the answer to practically all the things that trouble us. They answer the question of supply; you can't give the people what they need except by production. They answer the question of wages; you can't pay wages except by volume production. They answer the question of progressive efficiency; such national resources as we have today in industry are in the large-production industries."

Henry's business model encompasses the following concepts and values: "See how these things all hang together. You cannot lower prices unless you improve your methods. Improved methods can only work on the best of materials—poor materials are the most wasteful and expensive to work with—so the basic quality of your goods must improve. Economy requires that the very best labor be employed, and this calls for the highest wage—a cheap wage is always the dearest to everybody concerned, society most of all. It is strange that with all these values going up, prices can come down, but that is precisely the way it works. As prices come down to touch level after level or purchasing power, production goes up. And as a general and far-flung result, the standard of wealth and purchasing power of the whole community rises.

They are principles, and the application of those principles has created the America we now have—and which many of us believe we should at all costs preserve."

"Take the facts: In 1909, when Mr. Ford introduced his model T—the first real automobile at a low price—the average annual earnings of wage workers was \$560. The cheap car which he brought out cost around \$1000. That is, it took two years of labor for the average wage earner to earn as much as the price of a car. And there were only 305,950 passenger cars registered."

"In 1928, the average wage worker was earning \$1207 a year and the price of a far better car than was on the market in 1909 had dropped to between \$500 and \$600—which means that it took only six months' labor in 1928 to buy a better thing than had taken two years' labor in 1909. In 1928, 21,379,125 passenger cars were registered. There is an example of the American System at work.

The Model T and Model A not only revolutionized the transportation industry but, Henry Ford revolutionized production and economics.

the Harbor Model A club members and other car enthusiasts of all car types meet to talk cars. There are some very nice autos and some nice people there, too!



Technical Talk

ADDED GROUND CABLE INSTALLATION

INTRODUCTION

A good ground is essential for proper operation of the electrical system and the ignition system. A poor ground potential at the engine block and distributor can cause a poor running ignition system and rough running engine. A poor ground in the electrical system causes higher than normal currents to flow, resulting in burned out light bulbs. A poor ground to the Starter Motor causes a slow starting engine.

The ground post on the battery is connected to the main cross member of the frame. The ground potential of the frame is not always the same at the engine block due to rust buildup, paint, grease, and dirt build up over the years at the connections between the frame and engine block. The frame is electrically connected to the engine through the front and rear spring connection and through the rear motor mounts. These connections develope a high resistance from rust and dirt buildup, reducing the electrical ground potential between the frame and the engine. The addition of Float-A-Motor rear motor mounts also reduces the electrical ground potential between the frame and engine block due to the rubber mounts.

The metal engine pans, located on each side of the engine, provided a good positive ground connection between the frame and the engine block. Many times the engine pans have been taken off for removal of the oil pan and not replaced. This removes the main ground connection from the frame to the engine block.

An added ground cable, directly connected from the frame cross member at the battery ground connection, and attached to the transmission housing will ensure a good ground potential between the frame and the engine. A good ground to the engine will result in a smoother running engine, a faster turning Starter Motor for quicker starting, and improved lighting and longer burning light bulbs.

Installation

- 1. Use a 19" General Purpose #4 gauge battery cable. (This cable has a bolt eye at both ends).
- 2. Remove the frame bolt for the battery braided ground strap. Attach one end of the new ground cable, and the braided ground strap, to the frame bolt and reattach to the frame cross member.




Figure 4-15 Added Ground Cable

- 3. Route the new ground cable next to the center cross member and attach to the top of the transmission housing on the right side of the transmission (Figure 4-15). Ensure all connections are tight.


Harbor's Safety Inspection and Club Meeting
